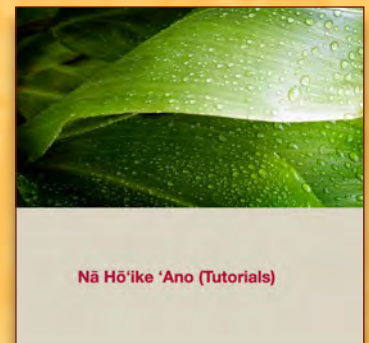


Digital 'Umeke

This growing online repository focuses on materials from the HPS Oral History Library built by HPS hand-in-hand with Kumu (masters) and kūpuna hula (elders). Digital 'Umeke holds transcripts from talk-stories with the elders, interview photographs, finding aids (research tool) for each session, lists of non-interview footage we have with the elders, and an array of edited video. The HPS interviews date back to our founding in 2000.

We are actively prepping materials, building new records, and sharing more resources, so be sure to check back regularly and see what's new!

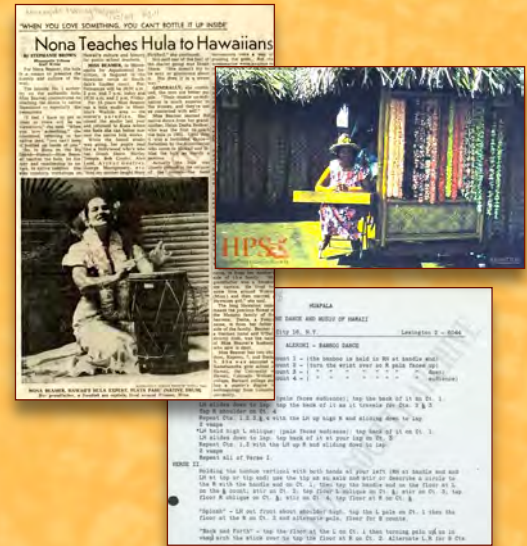
Tutorials

HPS on Papakilo Database

A wide selection of HPS resources can be found on Papakilo that reflect the depth and diversity of the larger Archive. These include paper materials (newspaper articles, historical hula routines, and career documents associated with the lives of kūpuna hula), images of Hawai'i and hula (1940s-1950s life, 1950s Hula Nani troupe, Lexington Hawaiian Room dancers in NYC), mele (song compositions), and audio clips of 20th century Hawaiian music (primarily 1930s-1960s).
